

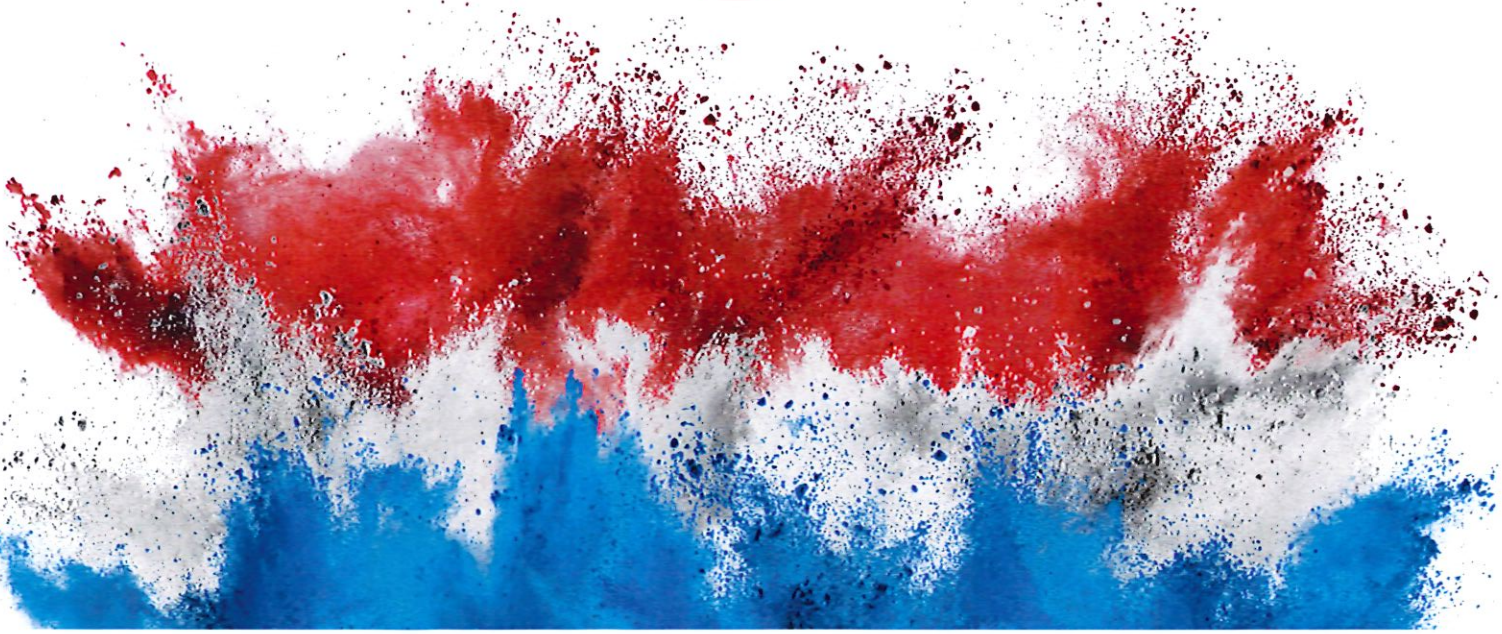

Bucket of Blooms

We invite you to bring your “bucket” of blooms to the fair this summer. The display will be in place from July 15 -July 19. The displays will be south of the 4-H Building.

Rules:

*Open to 4-H members or clubs, FFA Chapter or members, civic groups, church groups, family, or any individual. (you do not have to be from Audubon County). You need to register in the Fair Board Office when you bring your project. No need to register ahead of time and there is no entry fee.

* Plant in a bucket, a basket, a wagon, a teakettle, on a chair, in a purse... You decide. The display must be movable by one or two people in case we need to relocate due to weather.

*Flowers, plants, grasses, herbs must be real but may be purchased or grown from seed. Additional accessories such as flags, plant sticks, figurines, etc. are acceptable. Please include names of plants on your entry tag which will be furnished by the fair board.

All entrees will be put in place on the fairgrounds by their owner with instructions from a fair board member. They are to be in place Wednesday, July 15 by 3 PM until released on Sunday, July 19 after 2:30. Please take care to water your plants during the fair.

EVERYONE IS WELCOME AND ENCOURAGED TO ENTER ALL OPEN CLASSES. YOU DO NOT HAVE TO BE A RESIDENT OF AUDUBON COUNTY TO ENTER OPEN CLASSES AND THE YOUTH OPEN CLASSES ARE NOT CONNECTED WITH 4-H OR FFA.

OPEN CLASS RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All static exhibits (non-livestock) MUST be entered by NOON Wednesday, July 15, in the fair board secretary's office in the Agri-Hall. The actual exhibit must be in place in the Agri-Hall and the Antique Building by 3:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 15. The fair board secretary's office will also be open on Tuesday, July 14 between 9:00 a.m. and 6 p.m. so that you may get tags, exhibitor numbers and enter items. Judging for all static exhibits will start at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, July 16.

NOTE: Baked items and cut flowers, *may be delivered* on Thursday, July 16 by 8 AM, but still MUST be entered Wednesday, July 15 by NOON.

2. Entry blanks are in the back of this book. All entries must be made in the name of the owner and be the work of that person.
3. There is NO entry fee for static exhibits.
4. Static exhibits which have received previous awards at the Audubon County Fair cannot be entered again.
5. During the entry process, exhibitors will receive a tag, which must be completed and attached to exhibit.
6. Static exhibits must remain in place from entry until dismissal on Sunday, July 19 at 2:30 PM. Premium money will be forfeited for early removal. Items left after that time will not be the responsibility of fair board.
7. Pedigrees are required on purebred beef one year old or over. Animals under one year old must show papers of dam and sire. Failure to comply will forfeit all fees and bar exhibitor.
8. Animal exhibitors are expected to have animals ready and be at gate when class is called. If they are not, disqualification is at the decision of the superintendent.
9. **THE 2026 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND BIRDS AT A COUNTY 4-H/FFA FAIR EXHIBITION ARE INCLUDED IN THIS FAIR BOOK. Decisions of the Official Show Vet are FINAL.**

1. Equine activities are “inherent risk activities” and all individuals on the grounds assume such associated risks. Owners, leasers, lessees, and exhibitors are solely responsible for their animals.
2. Fees:
 - a. Entries the day of the show are due at the announcer's stand at the north of the horse arena starting at 9:00 a.m.
 - b. Entries may arrive the day of the show or may reserve a stall by contacting the superintendent for \$5.00 per stall. (4-H pays one fee at time of 4-H entry)
 - c. Entry is \$10.00 per horse or pony rider for the day
 - d. Entries must be paid as entered. There will be no refunds once entry is completed.
 - e. The Horse Fun show will start at 10:00 a.m.
3. Exhibitor must furnish own wood chips for bedding. No straw or paper bedding allowed. Stall must be cleaned and used bedding piled outside of the barns before leaving the fairgrounds. Exhibitor may work out of horse trailer if desired.
4. Lead Line age of rider is 6 years old and under.
5. Helmets are optional.
6. Appropriate footwear is encouraged.
7. Prizes will be awarded.

Premiums awarded in each class: \$3 \$2

See Open Class Rule #1 for entry and in place deadlines.

1. Grains may be exhibited in jars with lids.
2. Square Bale of Hay: Use section of square bale from center of bale. Must be 4 inches thick or more.
3. Sheaf Grass: Sheaf shall have center band and be at least 3 inches in diameter at this point.

IMPORTANT POINTS IN SELECTING HORTICULTURE PRODUCTS

Apples – Fruit should be free from insects, disease and mechanical injury. Color should extend well down in the basal end. Missing stems will be scored against.

Beets - Best size is 2-3 inches in diameter, smooth, well-shaped for the variety, and firm. Flesh should show a deep dark red color. White rings are undesirable.

Beets, Carrots, Parsnips – should have 1-2” of top left.

Cabbage – Outer leaves left on. Wrapper leaves removed.

Onions – Skin should be clean and bright, uniform in color and free from stain. Skin should not be broken and outer skin must not be removed. Neck should be small and dry. This indicates proper ripening and good keeping quality. Specimen should be solid, crisp and well matured.

Potatoes – Best size is 6 to 12 ounces. They should be free of soil, injury, and disease. They should be true to variety and uniform in type, quality, and size.

GENERAL SCORE CARD FOR HORTICULTURE PRODUCTS

Condition 35 points

Specimens should be clean, bright and free of blemishes, disease or injury.

Uniformity 20 points

Specimens should be uniform in size, maturity, form, color and condition.

Form 20 points

Form should be typical of variety, regular and smooth. Do not use misshapen specimens.

Color 15 points

Color should be typical of the variety and uniform.

Size 10 points

Specimens should be medium to moderately-large. Size should be such that it is usable on the table and would sell easily at the market. Very large or very small specimens rate low.
